## RC 22-24 CHARGE: SPECIAL COMMITTEE TO DEVELOP CONTEMPORARY DEFINITION OF PHYSICAL THERAPY

That a special committee of the House of Delegates be created to develop a definition of "physical therapy". The definition shall be a contemporary description of physical therapy that describes the profession's rightful place in healthcare, and the breadth and depth of physical therapy. The definition shall not be limiting and will be flexible to be relevant as the profession, health care, and research change over time.

The committee shall report to the House of Delegates in 2025.

## **SS**:

A. What is the expected outcome of this motion? How does it contribute to achieving the Vision? Does it support APTA priorities (as reflected in the current <a href="Strategic Plan">Strategic Plan</a>), and if so, how?

Answer: APTA will have a definition of physical therapy which reflects the profession's role in United States society. Currently there are many definitions of physical therapy which can be found online. It is fair to say none of these definitions are optimal and many have negative implications. How you are defined is what the world perceives of you. A lack of definition of physical therapy had impeded our advocacy efforts and achieving our optimal potential to benefit society. If you do not define yourself others will define you.

C. What previous or current activities of the House, Board, or staff address this topic? Who are the stakeholders that might be affected by this motion (internal to APTA as well as relevant groups external to APTA)? Answer: In 2011 the following motion was adopted by the House. RC 21-11 RECOGNITION OF PHYSICAL THERAPY AS A DISTINCT, SELF-DETERMINED PROFESSION That RC 21-11 Recognition of Physical Therapy as a Distinct, Self-Determined Profession be adopted as written: That the American Physical Therapy Association (APTA) advocate for physical therapy to be recognized as a distinct, self-determined profession. Efforts should continue to include evaluating and pursuing, where appropriate, opportunities to eliminate reference to the terms "allied," "allied health," "allied health profession," "allied



	health professional," and "ancillary" when used in association with or classifying the profession of physical therapy and the physical therapist, with a report to the 2012 House of Delegates.
